Tapuchim U'devash

The name of the Hebrew month in which Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur occur.

The Hebrew name for the 10 day period between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur. Aseret Y'mei Tshuyah

This Hebrew phrase means, "Our Father, Our King".

Avinu Malkeinu

The name of the Hebrew month before the High Holidays in which we make time for personal reflection.

A Rosh HaShanah greeting meaning "Have a Good Year." L'shanah Tovah

into moving water. *Tashlich*

The Hebrew name for the High Holiday prayer book.

Machzor

The Hebrew word referring to the phrase, "The Binding of Isaac" read on Rosh HaShanah. Akedah

The sound from this instrument wakes us to ask for forgiveness. It is made from a ram's horn.

Shofar

The Hebrew name for "The Days of Awe". Yamim Nora'im

This word literally means "turning". It means returning to the right path of conduct.

T'shuvah

One of the *shofar* sounds. It is a deep note that ends abruptly.

T'kiah

The custom of symbolically casting away our sins by throwing bread crumbs

Shevarim

Repentance, Prayer and Righteous behavior. The three major themes of the Yamim Noraim. T'shuvah, Tefilah, Tzedakah

One of the *shofar* sounds. It is a wavering or weeping sound consisting of nine short broken notes.

Teruah

Literally means "Head of the Year". It falls on the 1st and 2nd day of *Tishrei*. *Rosh HaShanah*

This is the person who calls out the names of the various sounds to be blown on the *shofar*.

Makri

Hebrew for "Day of Atonement", this tenth day of the month of *Tishrei* is a day for fasting and introspection.

Yom Kippur

In this part of the liturgy Jews direct their confessions to God without the assistance of an intermediary.

Vidui

The memorial service held on Yom Kippur,

and the last day of the three festivals.

Yizkor

Day of Rememberance is one of the four names for Rosh HaShanah
Yom HaZikaron

A traditional greeting used between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, it means "Be Sealed in the Book of Life for Good".

G'mar Chatimah Tovah

Literally means "All Vows" it is chanted on Erev Yom Kippur. Kol Nidre

Literally means "missing the target" it is the Hebrew word for Sin.

Chait

Prayers for forgivness. This term comes from the root *Slicha*, which means "Sorry".

S'lichot

Hebrew for "Day of Judgement", one of the four names for Rosh HaShanah.

The whale of a tale we read on Yom Kippur.

Yonah

word phrase literally means, "Day of the (shofar) Blast".

Yom Teru'ah

The name of the closing service for Yom Kippur.

N'ilah

One of the *shofar* sounds. It is a very long note that closes each shofar section.

T'kiah G'dolah

We hope to be inscribed in this "Book of Life". Sefer HaChayim

This food is baked into a round shape to signify that the year is a cycle.

Challah

A name for *Rosh* Hashanah, this two
