

<u>Hallel</u>

Topic

Prayer (*Tefillah*), *Hallel*, praise, Hanukkah, Sukkot, Simchat Torah, Shavuot, Pesach, Rosh Hodesh, Yom Haatzmaut

Grade Level

Intermediate

Goals for the Lesson/Activity

Students be able to...

- Identify when and why we say Hallel
- The ideas expressed in *Hallel*
- Apply their knowledge to compose their own poems of prayer/praise

Materials needed

Siddurim

Either provide students with the page numbers to find *Hallel* in your *siddur* (prayer book) or provide them with a range of pages in which to look for the prayer.

- Hallel acrostic sheet template for each student pair (available as a download on <u>www.Jteach.org</u>)
- Pens or pencils

Description of Activities

This activity can be used as a whole class activity or as 1 of several self-guided stations. If you are using this as a station, provide students with the Student Guide (available as a download from www.Jteach.org)

Whole Class Activity

Background and Introduction

A collection of psalms called *Hallel* (*meaning praise*) are recited during worship services on Hanukkah as well as Sukkot, Simchat Torah, Shavuot, Pesach, Rosh Hodesh, and Yom Haatzmaut. Further background on Hallel can be found on MyJewishLearning. For the full text and associated commentary, see what the Rabbinical Assembly wrote. You may choose to summarize this information for students and/or use it to inform your introductory discussion on when and why we recite Hallel.

Understanding and Application

Ask students to find *Hallel* in the *siddur*. Read some or all of the Psalms that make up *Hallel* in Hebrew and/or English. Ask students to share how and why God is praised in



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this collection of psalms. On the template, students write their own poem of prayer/praise in the form of an acrostic using the word *Hallel* as a starting point.
